



The national Peer Support Community Network (PSCN)


A national network of stakeholders from the Veteran, public safety personnel, peer support, research, Family and service provider communities

Design of the Guidelines

To improve **readability**:

- Avoiding extraneous language
- Bottom-line up front

To improve **navigation**:

• Inclusion of iconography

Icons used to highlight key content



Guideline definitions

Formal peer support

A benevolent relationship offered by trained peers using a structured framework (e.g. involving specific guidelines, and including structure and policy adherence).

Informal peer support

A benevolent relationship offered usually, although not always, by untrained peers in an unstructured manner (e.g. not following a specific set of guidelines).

- Ethical practices in peer support
- Selection and deselection of peer supporters
- Training of peer supporters
- Supervision for peer supporters
- How to maintain a peer support team
- Evaluation of peer support programs
