## Balancing operational and family needs

Like first responder, public safety, and military families, loneparent and dual-serving families face challenges of juggling the ever-changing logistics and managing the worries about the job. But the unique demands of solo caregiving or two conflicting shift schedules require additional adaptability, creativity, and organizational supports.

### What's needed



- More flexibility for shift start and finish times
- Flexibility as the standard, not the exception
- Flexible career development options
- 24/7 daycare as standard
- Further research and lived expertise on military/PSP family needs, throughout the life course

# What helps



**Empathetic leadership** – leaders who anticipate the realities and complex needs of families

**Community** – extended family, peer supporters, friends, and colleagues who 'get it' and are able to help

Family resilience – the cohesion that comes from ongoing teamwork, creative problemsolving and 'being in it together'

**Highlighting positives** – non-standard work schedules offer their own advantages for parenting and family activities, such as daytime availability and flexibility.
