Consequences of violence

- violence in the paramedic profession has been linked to:
 - · intent to leave the profession
 - · anxiety and symptoms of burnout
 - psychological strain
 - increased risk of developing Post-Traumatic Stress Injury (PTSI)
 - · increased absenteeism
 - · sleep difficulties
 - · negative impact on relationships with others



Consequences of violence


- second-order effects

- · BILL C321 is a great start!
- · the Government of Canada should:
 - · invest in research that would:
 - · determine the prevalence, frequency, type, outcomes, and impact of violence against paramedics
 - evaluate best practices for workplace violence prevention training and education strategies
 - · develop a national public awareness campaign that would:
 - · raise awareness about the violence faced by health care workers
 - · highlight the valuable role health care professionals play in providing care to Canadians

...to be included in discussions about proposed healthcare solutions
